Two faced Malema

“The question one would like to ask Julius Malema is why he wants the state in control of everything when there has been such obvious failure in proper administration and management, and such gross corruption. Should he say that it is so that the people may benefit, how will he convince us of such noble motives, when he lives in the lap of luxury with extravagant cars and properties, not to mention parties, while so many of “the people” are languishing in abject poverty?”

“In an interview on E-News Malema presented a side of himself one does not see when he is performing in front of his Youth League comrades, or when he is abusing and chasing a BBC correspondent from a press conference,” says Rev Theunis Botha, Leader of the Christian Democratic Party (CDP). “He spoke of nationalisation and the apparent benefits of State-control of key sectors within the economy of the country, such as mines and banks, giving all the usual ideological arguments as to why this could work. When challenged by the fact that the government has not been able to effectively handle competencies such as service delivery and safety and security assigned to them, he said that he had no doubt that they could do it. But then communists have always been blinkered when it comes to their past failures.”

“Malema may be able to fool some of the people, but he certainly does not fool us. His communist friends whom he says exercised such great influence over him, and whom he looked up to from the age of nine, such as Castro and Ché Guevara, have a history of their own. And why he didn't mention Stalin and Mao Zedong as well? One supposes that political correctness prevented him from doing so. Fact is that under the rule of all these, civil liberties were severely curtailed and religion was all but obliterated.”
